EDUCATION 6502 – CONTEXTS OF MUSIC EDUCATION

September 8-December 15, 2021

ED 6502 will be offered in a blended format with FOUR (on campus) seminar/workshop days, supplemented by online D2L components throughout the Fall Semester.

ED 6502 is one of the suite of required courses for the Music Education focus area – M. Ed in Curriculum, Teaching, and Learning Studies. This course may also be taken as an elective in other graduate programs, e.g in Education and Music.

ED 6502 is designed to examine foundational issues of music education, including issues related to the theory and process of curriculum design, implementation, and assessment within the discipline of music education. In this course, participants will be able to delve into an array of contexts of music education while investigating peoples, places and practices of music making, teaching, and learning.

Course topics include

- music education: curriculum – teaching – learning in varied music education contexts and settings
- music education within varied cultural, sociological, political, musical, demographic, philosophical, historical, educational, personal, and professional contexts
- music education and its place/role/value(s) in education, culture, and society
- music education - policy and practices (local-global)
- music education - school and community-based music contexts and relationships
- music education as a site for social justice, creativity, and critical pedagogy
- music/arts/cultural industry and school music education
- music education and indigenous ways of knowing
- music education and social-emotional learning
- music education and place-conscious pedagogy
- music education, self-identity, music teacher identity
